Adult Education Session Explores Living a Quaker Life

The final session of the series on Quakerism focused on how we as Friends translate our beliefs into our lives in the world. This

topic encouraged a sharing of personal experiences and inner struggles. Friends emphasized the belief 'that there is that of God in every person' as central to the way we interact with the other people in our lives.

Another basic Quaker value that Friends illustrated from their personal experiences was the belief

in continuing revelation -- that we make mistakes, accept our imperfections and keep growing toward the truth. Friends value sharing with others in this process. Life experiences with addiction, serving through work and taking a stand were described. Friends also emphasized the importance of inner silence, slowing down, listening and simplifying in order to remain centered.

Participants repeatedly expressed their appreciation of the non-judgmental attitudes they find in Brooklyn Meeting, as mistakes, struggles and differing

backgrounds and beliefs are accepted lovingly.
